WELCOME TO YOUR NEW WARD TATTENHAM CORNER AND PRESTON

The Boundary Commission has reduced the number of councillors and redrawn the ward boundaries throughout Reigate & Banstead Borough Council. Preston ward which has a single councillor will be joined to most of Tattenhams which has three, to create the new ward "Tattenham Corner and Preston". The new ward will have about 4,000 households and three councillors. The changes will take effect from the May 2019 borough elections.

Other Changes

To meet boundary review's requirements, it was necessary to equalise the numbers of voters, the eastern part of Tattenhams – all the electors between Reigate Road and Brighton Road, both sides of Tattenham Way – are transferring to the Nork ward. These are all the Tattenhams electors who vote at the Beacon School, rather than St Marks Church.

We deeply regret any voters will be moving out of Tattenhams, which has been largely in its current configuration for over 60 years. However, we are encouraged that Nork has a strong Residents' Association and is represented by three borough councillors who work as a group with the Tattenhams councillors. We will also be happy for any residents who want to simultaneously remain in membership with Tattenhams and receive our newsletter.

As far as Preston is concerned the few voters whose access is off Shelvers Way will move into a new Lower Kingswood, Tadworth & Walton ward; the vast majority will join up with Tattenhams.

Residents Association – working with and for you

The Tattenhams Residents Association will be renaming itself and expanding its reach to incorporate the Preston area, and we will be distributing our newsletters to homes in Preston. We welcome all Preston residents joining our Association.

We are volunteers – publicising and communicating through our newsletters and taking part in community events and initiatives to shape the local agenda. The Residents Association is run by residents for residents and the agenda is set by residents. If you would like to get involved, please see the contact details on the final page. You are welcome to come to our monthly committee meetings if you want to see what we do, or if you have a specific issue to discuss. They are held on the first Tuesday each month at the Tattenhams Library at 8pm.

Local Councillors

The Residents Association is passionately committed to a non-party political approach to local government and puts up its own councillors for election. The three Tattenhams councillors are all Residents Association Councillors. Joined with other Residents Association councillors across Reigate & Banstead and Surrey we form the largest opposition group at both councils. We will be seeking to retain our seats at the next election in May 2019.



What are our aims?

The Residents' Association campaigns to improve our area. We want to retain – and improve - local amenities for the benefit of all residents.

We cover the full range of local issues including planning and development, traffic and road improvements, public safety, schools, libraries, refuse and recycling, community services, parks and leisure.

County Council Cuts to Services

In recent newsletters we have forecasted major cuts to services at Surrey County Council. We were too early in our predictions – some one-off "pilot" funding from the government and dipping into reserves kept the wolf from the door for a while. But now the day of reckoning is well and truly here.

Government Funding

In 2010 the Council received general government grant funding of £152 million. This year the grant is zero, and it could even be negative next year. (Yes, the County Council might have to send money raised from residents in council tax back to the government's coffers!)

How has this come about? A major contributor has been the transfer of the learning disabled out of the long-term mental health hospitals around the edge of London into local authority care in the community. An overdue change in the treatment of these residents. Surrey had more patients than any other county and initially received £65 million funding which has now been withdrawn. It's been a similar story when the public health service was transferred to local authorities from the NHS, and the funding was £13 million short. This year, government grants for Special Educational Needs in schools has been sliced by £15 million, leaving the council to meet the cost of the agreed educational plans for affected children. Surrey's Highways funding is an estimated £13 million light compared to other councils when the extra wear caused by our exceptional traffic volumes is taken into account. Surrey with its two motorway service stations on the M25 is faced with one of the highest numbers of unaccompanied asylum-seeking children dropped off and taken into care; in this case government reimbursements are £5 million light.

Social Care

Looking after adults – both the elderly and mentally/ physically disabled – and children are statutory services and take more than 70p in every £1 spent by county councils. The numbers of people in these categories are growing. Other council services will be cut to plug the gap.

Reform of council funding, and of how the country pays for social care, is constantly being kicked down the road. One county council – Northampton - has become bankrupt and is being dismembered. Although it could be argued that Surrey has some special factors, Surrey's MPs includes five senior cabinet members – including the Chancellor of the Exchequer – and there would be a political uproar if special treatment were granted.

"Transformation" and Consultation

Most of the savings will be met by a transformation programme of severe back office cuts and efficiencies being launched by a new Chief Executive and her team. However, some require consultation with the public and this was launched at the beginning of November and will close on 4th January. The consultations can be found on line – go to the county council webpage www.surreycc.gov.uk. There's a short video there too which gives some more background.

If you don't have on line access hard copies are in the library, and library staff can help you provide your feedback. The five consultations and key proposals are:

- Community Recycling Centres Further closures are expected, although unlikely to include our nearby sites in Epsom, Leatherhead and Redhill. But more shorter hours/ days closed and further charges for non-household waste are likely.
- Special Educational Needs and Disabilities More advice earlier for schools, but a raid on school funding and reserves to support the service. On a positive note, 350 specialist school places in Surrey to replace expensive out of county schools.
- Concessionary Bus Travel Removal of the extra funding for free bus travel for disabled people before 9:30am and after 11pm on weekdays, and no free pass for a companion. Bus travel would still be free for those eligible (the elderly and disabled) between 9:30am and 11pm on weekdays, all day at weekend and public holidays, in line with the national scheme.
- Children's Centres Cut back to 19 main centres, meaning 31 would close and another 8 to become satellites. It is proposed that our local centre at Epsom Downs School in Merland Rise would keep open, and the Banstead centre would be its satellite. The focus would be help early on for the families with most need, and to try to prevent them needing social care in the future. In line with this, the Centres would cater for children up to the age 11, rather than only to 5. This sounds good however, a cut in staffing will mean less help overall.
- **Libraries and Cultural Services** A huge £4 million cut in funding in relation to the overall budget for this area must mean another threat to the Tattenhams Library.

Tattenhams Community Library - your Friendly Local Library



The library at Tattenham Corner is now staffed entirely by volunteers. We offer all the usual library services (books, audio books, DVD's etc) and a lot more besides. Books not available at our library can be reserved and collected here for a small fee.

Useful Services Daily and local papers are available for browsing as well as information on local services and events. We have 3 computers and WIFI to use are FREE to library members. We can do photocopying and faxing plus we also sell greeting cards, postage stamps, 2nd hand books, reading glasses and bags.

Children's Activities At 10.30am on Mondays and Fridays we have children's Rhymetime. During the summer holidays there is a Reading Challenge for children with small prizes for reading 2, 4 or 6 books and a certificate for those completing the whole challenge.

We support local activities and schools who have brought several classes to the library to learn about what we do and explore the children's area. Tadworth School annually bring two of their classes to us by train, dressed as wartime evacuees, learning about what it was like to be a child during World War 2.

Plea for help!!! We are looking for someone with experience of working with young children to co-ordinate these various activities as our volunteer who used to assume this role has unfortunately moved away. Please contact Sue Spackman at the library if you are interested.

Other Activities On the 2nd Wednesday of the month we have a Tea and Cake afternoon. We also have occasional talks or events which we advertise on the Surrey CC website or just come into the library for more details.

So, we are more than just a library – come in and visit us! It's a fabulous place to volunteer and if you aren't a member already join soon and keep supporting us.

Maria Hewson - Community Development in Preston

Well it's been a very busy and interesting year. I started this post in June 2018 and my feet haven't touched the ground since! Thank you for all your support.

I feel my role has three strands:

improve services for them.

- 1. Getting to know the community as best I can, engage with residents to find out what they like about living in the area where they feel the strengths are what they would like to change discover gaps in services then work with members of the community on projects to make it an even better place to live.
- 2. Working with local organisations who offer support and services to residents in the community. This means I'm up to date with changes and know where to signpost residents for help.



My first six months were spent getting to know as many of the residents as possible and finding out what organisations there are locally. Everyone has been so welcoming and open with me. I discovered that there is a lot of good work happening in the area but there could be more joined up working and sharing of information.

I started the Preston Partner Network Meeting which meets every three months to discuss what has been happening and plans for the next three months. There are over fifty organisations on the distribution list and twenty five to thirty attend each time. This has proved invaluable for me. We carried out a SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats) analysis which led to an action plan; I'm trying to work through this.

I have been involved in a pilot project for young people aged 10-16 to access sports activities at the leisure centre for a reasonable cost. Many young people felt unwelcome at the leisure centre or couldn't afford to attend. The pilot was a success and we are planning to start a year's project starting this month. I have worked with the regeneration team at the council and an inclusive, outdoor gym has been ordered for the park.

Feedback from residents was that there wasn't enough of a community feel and there was nothing to look forward to. We held the Preston Community Event on 15th September which was supported by local organisations and attended by 300 residents. It was a great atmosphere and plans are afoot to do it again next year.

I'm working with residents and partners on reducing anti-social behaviour; a Good Neighbour scheme to help people with transport, shopping, befriending etc; a Neighbourhood Watch scheme; affordable access to leisure facilities; more activities for the community to improve health and reduce isolation.

Regeneration Board Update

Besides the outdoor gym mentioned by Maria above, there have been improvements in the paths over Preston Park. The original gravel paths were messy and created puddles - the new paths with a bound surface are a great improvement. A youth shelter is also planned – see below - but it will only be implemented once it can be covered by CCTV.

Other areas of concern are the lack of parking, particularly around the Chetwode Road area, once the new de Burgh housing is complete. We are hoping to see plans soon. There are also plans for short sections of one way roads at the ends of Long Walk and Broad Walk to reduce rat-running.

Mud from the development site is a concern particularly now winter is here; the developer is obliged to keep the road swept. We asked for signs at the ends of St Marks Road and Chapel Way, so delivery lorries keep out of the side streets.
